SURF & BEACH

The swell is 1m southeasterly with bigger sets along the open beaches and about 0.75m in the bays on the northern side of headlands. It's a bit bigger on the Tweed and Byron coasts. The wind is forecast to be light to moderate south to southwesterly this morning, becoming southeasterly during the day. The water temperature is 19-20C and tides will be low about 3.30am and 3pm and high about 9.30am. Surfers should look for waves on points and beach breaks early on the making tide, the beach breaks around the top of the tide and then on the points again from before lunch through the afternoon as the wind swings southeasterly and the tide falls off. Rips and sweeps will be working along open stretches of beach and they will be enhanced on the afternoon ebb tide. The best and safest beaches for a swim will be Noosa, Mooloolaba, Burleigh, Kirra, Greenmount and Rainbow Bay.

BOATING

Seas in offshore waters will be choppy on a 1.5m to 2m southeasterly swell. Close inshore and on the coastal bars, the swell is 1m with bigger sets. Bars are workable with usual caution required when crossing one. On Moreton Bay, seas will be choppy in the open northern and eastern parts and the best boating conditions will be in the western bay this morning and in the more sheltered parts of Pumicestone Passage, the southern bay from Macleay Island to the northern parts of Southport Broadwater and rivers and creeks.

COASTAL WEATHER

A high-pressure system east of Tasmania extends a firm ridge along the Queensland coast but will move eastwards across the Tasman Sea and weaken during the next couple of days. An upper trough which triggered light rain and showers over southeast Queensland yesterday will also move off the coast today and showers will decrease this afternoon. Today's forecast for offshore waters from Double Island Point to Point Danger and Moreton Bay is for morning showers decreasing with 10 to 15 knot southeasterly winds, reaching 15 to 20 knots at times in offshore waters. Early this morning, there will be lighter south to southwesterly winds close inshore and in the western parts of Moreton Bay.
